

Open Source in the Enterprise: Motivation

- The Open Group member's profile is strong in enterprise
- Insertion of new methods / technologies into an Enterprise Architecture must be strategic
- This requires facts about Open Source, not FUD
- Many players around Open Source provide information and disinformation
- □ This intersection led to Open Source in the Enterprise:
 - Collect, structure and collate factual information
 - Provision information (publications, seminars, discussions)
 - Establish a neutral trusted place for sharing facts
